Questions for Pastor...

Three "Can we..."" questions:

Can we start gathering the offering during worship again? (Instead of just having a basket by the door)?

This question came up during our May Elders' meeting. Gathering offerings and bringing them to the altar during worship is a great way to remind us that God is the Giver of all that we have. It's a way of acknowledging that we aren't just giving money to support the congregation, rather we are presenting our offerings as a way of saying "Thanks" to God for everything He's given us.

We quit gathering offerings during worship three years ago as a covid precaution. Since those protocols are no longer in effect, we can certainly begin "passing the plate" during worship. This means we have a need for more ushers to gather the offering and bring it to the altar. It's a simple way for families (or spouses) to serve the Lord together. Please talk to me if you have any questions or just sign up at church.

Can we get After-worship Fellowship going again?

One of the other "ruts" we got into during covid was not getting together after service for coffee and conversation with other members of our church family. It's really tough to say much more than "Hi, how are you doing?" during "share the peace" time during worship. Having time to sit down after the Sunday service gives us a much better chance to connect with each other, so, yes, we will be having a dedicated time of fellowship after service.

Some of you had signed up quite awhile ago to bake cookies for fellowship time. We have "ready-to-bake" cookies you can take home to bake. Mona Hjelle volunteered to coordinate this after-service fellowship during the summer, so if you signed up to bake cookies, she may be checking with you soon.

Can I text or email people on a daily basis with a link to an audio recording of a daily reading/devotion?

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This was an "Is this possible?" type of question that I actually asked. In the sermon on May 21, I suggested making a conscious decision to spend 10-15 minutes a day growing your faith over the summer. (Kind of like I had to make a conscious decision to spend 15 minutes a day in my garden, watering and pulling weeds.) I thought it might help to get a Bible passage you can just click on and listen instead of having to look up one.

I think I figured out how to do this, so if you haven't signed up already for a daily audio reading, you can still do so! We'll be going through Jesus' parables during the month of June. They will also be listed on our Daily Readings page of the Newsletter as well as at livingwordlutheran.net



Thoughts for Father's Day...

Fatherhood was one of the first responsibilities God gave men.

Fatherhood was one of the first jobs God gave men. Immediately after creating Adam and Eve, God commanded them to "be fruitful and multiply." (Genesis 1:28) One of His primary purposes for marriage was offspring who would fill the earth with God's praise and glory. However, providing sperm for conception is merely the beginning of God's expectations for fathers. The Bible provides many points of guidance on what God's expectation is to be a good father.

Here are just a few verses that describe a father's role:

- Psalm 103:13 As a father shows compassion to his children, so the Lord shows compassion to those who fear him.
- Ephesians 6:4 Fathers, do not provoke your children to anger, but bring them up in the discipline and instruction of the Lord.
- Proverbs 20:7 The righteous who walks in his integrity— blessed are his children after him!
- Colossians 3:21 Fathers, do not provoke your children, lest they become discouraged.
- Proverbs 4:1-9 Hear, O sons, a father's instruction, and be attentive, that you may gain insight, for I give you good precepts; do not forsake my teaching. When I was a son with my father, tender, the only one in the sight of my mother, he taught me and said to me, "Let your heart hold fast my words; keep my commandments, and live. Get wisdom; get insight; do not forget, and do not turn away from the words of my mouth. ...
- Proverbs 13:24 Whoever spares the rod hates his son, but he
 who loves him is diligent to discipline him.
- Proverbs 22:6 Train up a child in the way he should go; even when he is old he will not depart from it.
- 3 John 1:4 I have no greater joy than to hear that my children are walking in the truth.
- Psalm 127:3-5 Behold, children are a heritage from the Lord, the fruit of the womb a reward. Like arrows in the hand of a warrior are the children of one's youth. Blessed is the man who fills his quiver with them! He shall not be put to shame when he speaks with his enemies in the gate.

Ten Characteristics of a Godly Father

 A godly father knows God – It should be without stating, but many men want their children to have a relationship with God but do not have that relationship themselves. Children model what

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they see. So godly fatherhood begins within the heart of a man.

- A godly father loves and honors his wife it has been said that the
 best gift a father can give his children is to love their mother. Even
 if a man is divorced or single, he can still model respectful behavior
 towards his child's mother. Children imitate what they see.
- 3. A godly father accepts responsibility for his children's spiritual training While providing financially for a family is an important responsibility for fathers (1 Timothy 5:8) it is not their only responsibility. A father must encourage Christian character in his children by his example as well as his words of instruction and the expectations of behavior he sets forth for and enforces with his children.
- A godly father is continually aware of his influence fathers may not realize it but everything they do is influencing their children.
 Words alone are not enough.
- A godly father models selfless service much of Jesus' earthly life
 was given to serving others. As followers of Jesus, we are to imitate
 that service (Matthew 20:28). Godly fathers figure out ways to involve their children in acts of service.
- A godly father is consistent nothing confuses children more than inconsistency, either in discipline or example. A father that is loving one minute and angry the next creates insecurity in his children.
- A godly father disciplines his children appropriately discipline is a part of child-rearing and should not be ignored or solely delegated to the mother. Hebrews 12:9-10 reminds us that earthly fathers disciplined us for our own good and our heavenly Father does the same.
- A godly father does not allow himself to be controlled by outside influences. Addictions such as alcohol or drugs often create a home environment marked by insecurity, fear, and depression. Fathers that display addictive behaviors often teach their children to do the same.
- A godly father is a man under authority Due to his sinful nature, a man will fight to be his own boss. However, Jesus demonstrated that He was a Man under the authority of his heavenly Father. He readily gave credit to God for His successes and submitted Himself fully to the will of God.
- 10. A godly father will lead the world is in desperate need of men who will lead wisely. Leadership is not domination or control. A leader is one who goes first. He sets the pace for the family by practicing what he preaches. He is on the lookout for dangers and takes initiative to protect his family from them. He is a man that his children can be proud of (Proverbs 17:6)

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A Minute for Families...

6 Reasons to Have a Weekly Family Meeting

(Even if "family" is just two of you).

Did you have family meetings when you were a kid? Were they a regular occurrence or only when there was a crisis or situation that warranted it? Depending on your experience, your feelings about them might range from fond memories to dread. Family meetings don't have to be something tied to negative memories for your own family. Establishing a weekly family meeting can have a lot of great benefits for both individual members and the family as a whole. Here are 6 reasons to start one:

It's intentional time for the whole family to communicate.

Whether your family is big, small, or somewhere in between, communication that includes the entire family isn't going to be perfect. Chances are you might forget to let someone know about the plans for next weekend, or only half the family is on the same page about the new screen time rules. A regular meeting provides a standing chance for members to make sure everyone is in the know and no one is unintentionally left in the dark.

They build a sense of solidarity and belonging.

When you're all usually going in a million different directions for work, school, activities, hobbies, etc., that "family unit" feeling of connection can dwindle if you're not careful. While it's healthy for members to have separate interests, a regular family meeting can help balance out the sense of separateness with a consistent opportunity to reconnect as a family. While sitting down for a meal together every day serves a similar secondary purpose, you'll occasionally have a super hectic week where that doesn't happen as much as you'd like. The family meeting is a great backup to have in place.

They help the family navigate transitions.

Transitions are hard for couples and families alike. Whether it's a move to a new dity, a change in family structure, or a new daily routine, a weekly meeting can help that often bumpy period of time go just a bit smoother. Members can share their worries, offer each other reassurance, or gain clarity that may help them get through the big changes you're facing together. It's also a great time to check in with each person on how they're doing or make any necessary adjustments as a family going forward.

You can get everyone's input.

If you have a family decision you'd like everyone to weigh in on, a fami-

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rou never realize chips and salsa. ly meeting is a great time to do it. Whether it's where to go on your next family vacation or what pizza toppings to get for your weekly pizza night, you'll conveniently have everyone in one place to share their thoughts and opinions on the matter—or even take a quick vote. You'll ensure everyone's voice is heard and no one is left out.

It's a chance to celebrate accomplishments and offer support.

There's no better time to call out things worth celebrating than when the whole family is present. Did someone make the honor roll or ace a big test? You or your spouse just finish up a big project at work? Give all the props, praise, and high fives. On the flip side, there will be times when family members are looking for encouragement, and this is an equally opportune time to offer that. A weekly meeting is like having a family cheering section for daily life, building members' confidence and providing support when they need it.

You can tailor it to your season of life.

You might be wondering: How old should our kids be when we start this? What if there's a wide range in age? What if we don't have kids? The great news is there is no right or wrong answer here. The key is to do what works for you and your family in your current situation. Make adjustments as you need to. This might mean the family meeting is actually just a weekly logistical check in for you and your spouse if you don't have children or they're still too young to actively take part. Or it could mean you set up a weekly video call with your parents and siblings instead. It might mean only some of your kids participate, or they only join for part of the meeting. Don't let worries of "doing it right" hold you back—just start one!

For many people, family meetings are associated with crisis, and it makes sense. When there's an intense family situation, it's usually the go-to way to get all hands on deck. However, making family meetings a regular, weekly occurrence turns it into a positive bonding experience.

UNKNOWN SOLDIER By Deirdre Reilly

Although it is summertime now, one way to keep Christmas in your heart all year long is to remember the lessons of Christmas throughout the year. This brings me to recall something very special that happened to two men and three children, and bears repeating.

Very early in the morning last December, my husband and my eight year old son happened across a United States Army soldier on an exit ramp near the town where we live. It was a very cold Sunday morning, when frost lay on the ground and tree limbs were stark and twisted against a thick gray sky. Not too many other cars were out, and those who were out were hurrying to get somewhere, exhaust coming from each car in warm-looking puffs as they glided down the highway, frost still on the windshields. My husband and son were coming home from my son's 6 AM hockey game, and looking forward to getting breakfast out together and then returning home, where the rest of us lay dreaming.

As my husband approached the end of the ramp the soldier got out of his car, a grey Maxima that had broken down. The soldier was in full dress uniform, and was cold, and very young; early twenties, my husband guessed. My husband pulled over to see what he could do to help. The soldier needed a cell phone, he said – he was going to call his girlfriend to see if she could come and get him and his two daughters – his daughters were bundled into the cold car – and bring them back home to Derry. NH, where they lived.

My husband looked into the car and saw the soldier's four year old, dressed in her best party dress, and a baby, zipped up to her chin into her thick snuggly. The three of them had been on their way to a Christmas party at the Boston barracks when the car had chosen that time to die. At this point, the soldier was just trying to get home; the party had been given up on. The little girl grinned at my husband from the back seat, and I know he must have grinned back at her, too.

My husband moved the little girls into our car, where the four year old proceeded to become very interested in my eight year old—"she was patting me," he reported in a resigned way to me later, upon the retelling of their memorable morning—and the men talked about the young soldier's options. My husband told me that this young man was, to him, a soldier first—someone who already, with his young life, done much for us just by his service—but he was also a young man who still didn't have all the answers. We have a son of our own who is just a few

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wæn't eæier a generation ago, bu robots to fact-check their parents. years younger than this soldier who was sitting beside him. The soldier didn't have Triple A, and he had no one to call for help. As the baby stared, round-eyed, at them all, my husband offered his Triple A for a tow, and then offered to take the soldier and the children into Boston for the party. The soldier had decided to just try to get back home, and so they called for the tow and my husband offered to drive the three of them back to New Hampshire.

They chatted as they waited; my husband commented that the Christmas party sure was early, if they had been on the road at six in the morning, and the soldier commented that "the army does everything early." They all sat together, my family and his, and then headed up north after the tow truck came, the soldier's broken-down car following behind them.

There is the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier, guarded twenty-four hours a day with honor in Washington, D.C., but there is also the living Unknown Soldier, among us every day. Crippled by war, perhaps, or mentally ravaged by what he has seen in a country far away, or maybe just young, and needing a hand with the stuff of everyday life—they are here, with us right now. We are sometimes stymied by the American

soldier - how do you begin to thank people who pick up a gun and say good-bye to everyone who matters and fly far away because they believe in protecting the country we all live in?

Sometimes, you give them a cell phone and your Triple A, and make sure their children are warm. My husband watched the uniformed soldier and his dressed-up little girls dimb the steps of their big old three-family house, where toys dotted the yard and the frost was beginning to thaw and show the green underneath. My husband was reluctant to talk about this to me, downplaying the aid he had offered. But eight year olds sing like canaries. I think my husband feels that at the end of the day, it was just one dad helping another dad get his children home. And one man helping another, too, trying, through his actions to say thank you very much, Unknown Soldier, for all you have given up and gone through and laid down for all of us, even though to you, we are Unknown Americans.

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
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Story Behind The Song...

"I Have Decided to Follow Jesus"

Some of the greatest hymns are derived from the worst tragedies. This month's song is such an example and is one of the best stories of unshakable faith.

'I Have Decided to Follow Jesus' is a Christian hymn originating from India. The lyrics are based on the last words of a man in Assam.

The late 1800's saw an evangelistic explosion in India. Entire provinces formally closed to the gospel were swept up a missionary movement perhaps unparalleled in history. Wales in particular sent hundreds of missionaries to Northern India, and they were joined by Indian evangelists, as well as missionaries from England, Australia, and the United States. This movement was remarkable for two reasons; first, it was led mostly by Indians themselves, and those men became national figures. Second, this missionary endeavor was focused on Northern India, which was firmly in the grips of the most oppressive forms of Hinduism. It was a place where the caste system was entrenched, and where headhunters ruled.

Into these hostile and aggressive communities, came a groups of missionaries spreading the message of love, peace and hope in Jesus Christ. Naturally, they were not welcomed. In the 1880's a Welsh missionary who had endured severe persecution finally saw his first converts in a particularly brutal village in the Indian province of Assam. A husband and wife, with their two children, professed faith in Christ and were baptized.

Angry, the village chief summoned all the villagers. He then called the family who had first converted to renounce their faith in public or face execution of the entire family Moved by the Holy Spirit, the man said:

That for a day: The bravest thing you can act accordingly.

"I have decided to follow Jesus."

Enraged at the refusal of the man, the chief ordered his archers to shoot the two children. As both boys lay twitching on the floor, the chief asked, "Will you deny your faith? You have lost both your children. You will lose your wife too."

But the man replied:

"Though no one joins me, still I will follow."

The chief was beside himself with fury and ordered his wife to be killed In a moment she joined her two children in death. Now he asked for the last time, "I will give you one more opportunity to deny your faith and live." In the face of death the man said the final memorable lines:

"The cross before me, the world behind me. No turning back."

He was shot dead like the rest of his family. But with their deaths, a mirade took place. The chief who had ordered the killings was moved by the faith of the man. He wondered, "Why should this man, his wife and two children die for a Man who lived in a far-away land on another continent some 2,000 years ago? There must be some remarkable power behind the family's faith, and I too want to taste that faith."

Later, in a spontaneous confession of faith, he dedared, "I too belong to Jesus Christ!" When the crowd heard this from the mouth of their chief, the whole village accepted Christ as their Lord and Saviour.

The formation of these words into a hymn is attributed to the Indian missionary Sadhu Sundar Singh. The melody is also Indian and with the title "Assam" after the region where the text originated. An American hymn editor, William Jensen Reynolds, composed an arrangement that was published in 1959 and became a regular feature of Billy Graham's evangelistic meetings in America and elsewhere, spreading its popularity.
